RITE13 (6th-7th)

Journey to Adulthood (8th-9th)

On the second & fourth Sundays of the month, Journey to Adulthood (J2A for short) students meet with their mentors for small group discussions around growing into the responsibilities of Christian adulthood. Afterwards, they gather with the Rite13ers for recreation, where said discussion on adulthood may be temporarily forgotten.

HIGH CLASS DINNER (9th-12th)

On the second & fourth Thursdays of the month, High School St. Lukers gather at the Cannans' home for food, fun, and highly stimulating conversation around the ontological realities of adolescence in light of the eschatological expectations of the church. Uh.. what? Questions are welcome, and, if you have all the answers already, please, come and enlighten us. Proper attire, including tuxedo t-shirt, is required.

 Crossroads Community Ministries (CCM) www.crossroadsatlanta.org

Crossroads began in the St. Luke's Parish Hall in 1973 with a parishioner's simple act of offering her sandwich to a hungry visitor. From that initial act of kindness grew the St. Luke's Soup Kitchen, which eventually expanded to become Crossroads Community Ministries, now serving as one of the primary "first stops" for Atlanta's homeless. Still located on the St. Luke's campus, CCM provides 73,000 weekday meals a year, operates a mailroom, and provides disability services and case management for its "guests" (the term used for the people served). CCM focuses on the newly homeless with an emphasis on providing transitional support services to help individuals and families become self-sufficient.

Volunteers Needed for:

Mail Room – Open: Mon-Fri, 9:15am-12:30pm. Sort and distribute mail (with a big smile). Flexible days and hours.

Kitchen – Open: Mon-Fri, 9:00-11:00 am. Prepare and serve meals to the hungry. Flexible days and hours.

Professional Case Management – Open: 9:30am -12:00 noon

Case Managers are needed to personally meet with individuals and families to provide services and connect to resources. Training is required and will be provided.

Carpentry/Light Contracting Help – Anytime. Due to the age of the building, there is a great need for volunteers with expertise in building services to keep the facilities maintained.

•"I Have A Dream"® - A.D. Williams Chapter (IHAI In 2001, under the auspices of the nation "I Have A Dream"® Foundation, St. Luke's ar Ebenezer Baptist Church teamed up to nurtu 60 at-risk second graders from A.D. William Elementary School by supporting their educ tion and pledging college tuition assistance. The ambitious 12-year program offers mentoring, toring, and life skills enrichment for the kids, ar fosters transformative relationships that enrivolunteers and youth alike. The Dreamers, no (mostly) entering tenth grade, still face myrichallenges along the road to success.

Volunteers Needed for:

Mentoring - Mentors agree to interact with a particular Dreamer on a regular basis for one year, i.e., talking to their Dreamer at lea once weekly and doing something togethe at least twice a month. One of these meetings may be the regularly scheduled culturs social, or educational group activity held or the third Saturday of each month (e.g., visit ing the King Tut exhibit, summer pool party Christmas party, etc.).

Tutoring – two hours, one Saturday morning per month, St. Luke's tutors meet with Dreamers for Homework Help sessions. Previous teaching experience is not required; however, some familiarity with high school math, science, English or history is a plus.

Event Planning - Work directly with the Program Director and Office Administrator to plan a particular Saturday event. This volunteer slot entails a good bit of planning and preparation, particularly in the 30 days preceding the event. Generally this is a short-term commitment.

Supporting Roles - Drivers, lunch deliverers and chaperones are always needed for group activities. Drivers need to provide proof of insurance and a valid Georgia Driver's License. Assistance in these areas is needed on a recurring basis. Volunteers may do as much as they like with very flexible scheduling.

Standing Together

This ministry grew out of a desire within St. Luke's to do more to help Crossroads' clients who, poised to make the leap from homelessness to self-sufficiency, need support to successfully make the transition. Once or twice per year, this relationship-based ministry assembles a diverse group of six parishioners to create a supportive "family" unit for an individual or family that has been screened and recommended by Crossroads. Since its inception in 2005, Standing Together has launched six family teams, and a seventh family is in the works for fall 2010. In addition, parishioners loosely organized into a resource team may lend occasional support or expertise, as needed.

Volunteers Needed for:

Family Teams - One Year Commitment Volunteers commit to be a member of a family team for one year. The family team meets with the client individual/family at least twice monthly, and meets periodically with the Standing Together steering committee. Volunteers participate in a one-day training session. Resource Team - Flexible Commitment

Refugee Resettlement Ministry

The Refugee Resettlement Ministry offers Christian hospitality to newly-arrived refugees from countries such as Bhutan, Burma, Iraq, Ethiopia, and the Congo. Begun in 2008 by a small group of parishioners, this ministry works through referrals from Refugee Resettlement and Immigration Services of Atlanta, and provides a supportive, personal connection with families facing a bewildering new world. The duration of ministry with each family is 3-4 months. Our first family, a Bhutanese father, mother and pre-teen daughter are now financially self-sufficient, have acquired their own car and a new baby all within the first 18 months of arrival in Atlanta. In 2010 we supported two Burmese sisters with a three year old son and that family has also slowly achieved stability.

Preparing for the family's arrival - Gather furniture for the apartment and/or help decorate the family's new home.

Millennium Development Goals

The Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) were established in 2000 in an effort to reduce, by the year 2015, the number of people living in extreme poverty. Developed by the international community, including leaders from 191 countries, the eight goals have been endorsed by development institutions and religious bodies, and have galvanized unprecedented energy and support.

At its 74th General Convention in 2003, the Episcopal Church formally endorsed the MDGs. In 2006, at the 75th Convention, the Church voted to make the MDGs a mission priority, and subsequently established a budget line item of 0.7% to support the achievement of the MDGs.

- Eradicate extreme poverty and hunger.
- 2. Achieve universal primary education.
- 3. Promote gender equality and empower women.
- 4. Reduce child mortality.
- 5. Improve maternal health.
- Combat HIV/AIDS, malaria, and other diseases.
- 7. Ensure environmental sustainability.
- 8. Develop a global partnership for development.





2010 Outreach Grants at St. Luke's
